**IN LOVING MEMORY:** The Sanctuary Lamp is available for your intentions by calling the parish office. Please attempt to request your intention as early as possible. A \$10 donation is suggested.

**SACRAMENT OF PENANCE:** Confessions are heard regularly on the First Saturday of every month at 3:00-3:30 PM (suspended until Ft. John is well). Confession may ALWAYS be arranged with Fr. John personally by calling the rectory office. Please avail yourselves to this life-giving sacrament!

**SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE:** Scheduled no less than **nine months** prior to the date of marriage. Four preparation sessions with the pastor, as well as all diocesan requirements, must be met. All Catholic candidates for Marriage must be registered, practicing members of a parish at least 6 months prior to scheduling the weddina.

**INFANT BAPTISM:** Baptisms are generally celebrated during one of the Sunday Liturgies. Prebaptismal instructions must be completed by the parents at least 3 weeks prior to the celebration of the sacrament. Catholic godparents must obtain a letter of eligibility from their pastors four weeks in advance. Baptisms are never celebrated during the Season of Lent. **ANOINTING OF THE SICK:** Celebrated after any Sunday Mass as requested and as a parish during the Easter Season.

**MEMBERSHIP:** Forms are located on the back page of the bulletin (or on the parish website) to be filled out and sent to the parish. Registrations are also welcome by phone.

Jim Golias : December was an inundating month for me and I shut down completely once I contracted COVID. During that time our beloved brother in Christ, Jim Golias, died on December 18, and was buried. Jim was a faith-filled man and that was demonstrated in so many ways. Within our own walls, he served as a beloved usher/ greaeer. One cannot help but remember the years he met parishioners in the back where a greeting which more often than not became an engaging conversation with a lively demeanor. He was a very, very

He also showed love for his fellow human persons as a veteran of the Korean War (he had many conversations with my dad who also served in post-war Korea.) From the Pastor's Desk: There a quite a few things that I would like address this week; hopefully in a benign yet significant manner, all of which is written in an earnest way.

First I would like to say a few things regarding the Mass. First, hopefully every member of the parish in 2020 knew that the obligation to attend Sunday Mass (physically) was reinstituted. This means that according to Church teaching, to fail to attend mass (physically), unless one is ill or homebound, is a mortal sin. The convenience of watching mass at home or on the internet is no longer a valid reason for not attending Mass. The return to this practice reminds us that part of the reality of Church is community, for Christ is also present in the assembly. If you know of someone who does not come to mass for any unexcused reason, gently ask them to come home. Second, there are a few issues that we need to be reminded of regarding the celebration of liturgy: a.) remaining in the vestibule of the Church during Mass does not fulfill one's Sunday obligation; b.) Mass does not end until the end of the final hymn. Please only leave early for the most serious of reasons; c.) it is customary the we stand during the reception of Holy Communion. You may also receive Communion in your mouth or in your hand. IT IS NOT OUR PRACTICE TO GENUFLECT OR KNEEL DURING THE RECEPTION OF COMMUNION. The reason is two-fold: it can be dangerous to others around you (I have seen people trip when someone genuflects in front of them), Also, it goes completely against the call of Vatican II for unity and uniformity; and d.) please refrain from any unnecessary talking or conversion while Mass is being celebrated.

## AS FOR GOOD NEWS THE PARISH IS DOING WELL AS

WE BEGIN 2024. We are financially stable; however, we can always do better. Our numbers in terms of Church attendance we are relatively stable (again we can always do better). Our parish participation at liturgy has grown quite a bit over the last several months. I congratulate you for your decision to become people who exercise "full conscious, active" participation in the Eucharist. You have been supremely generous to the poor, especially the food drives that we have periodically. Our buildings and grounds are quickly getting up to speed (after 20 years of mismanagement) and I have no worries about maintenance. And last, please consider giving to the "Catholic Ministry Drive." I am the first person to say that you have every right to have issues with the bishop and/or the diocese, due to a lack of mindfulness (perceived or real) in regard to parish in the past. Why I am asking you to participate is that I have heard through the grapevine that there may be some type of assessment for parishes who do not meet 25% of their goal or higher. Our goal is nearly \$27,500 one fourth of that amount would be \$6,875. Even if we made a modest effort to increase the amount the parish contributes, I believe the diocese would look favorably on this. However, giving to the CMD is a truly a matter of conscience and must be followed (whether you decide to give or not."



# **JUBILEE CORNER:** Stage I

I finally made definitive arrangements with regard to the Visitation Pilgrimage to Italy in Celebration of the Great Jubilee year 2025.
