SACRAMENT OF PENANCE: Confessions will not be heard regularly until Fr. John has recovered from his liver transplant. <u>Confession may AL-</u> WAYS be arranged with Fr. John personally by calling the rectory office. Please avail yourselves to this life-giving sacrament!

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Scheduled no less than **nine months** prior to the date of marriage. Four preparation sessions with the pastor, as well as all diocesan requirements, must be met. All Catholic candidates for Marriage must be registered, practicing members of a parish at least 6 months prior to scheduling the wedding.

INFANT BAPTISM: Baptisms are generally celebrated during one of the Sunday Liturgies. Catholic godparents must obtain a letter of eligibility from their pastors four weeks in advance. Baptisms are never celebrated during the Season of Lent.

extended to all parishioners. We also pray the litany of St. Joseph since Wednesday is dedicated to him as the patron of the Universal Church. Remember the parish intention is for Fr. John's health, however, personal intentions for the Rosary and adoration are your own.

This October, the Church will continue her three year synodal process during which She has asked herself to study groups and will explore the theological, pastoral and canonical aspects of some of the thorniest questions raised during the synod listening sessions and discussed at the first synod assembly last October in the hope that the Spirit will inspire openness on the part of the hierarchy, religious, and laity about the way that the Church lives out the mission of the Gospel in the Spirit of Vatican II. There are 9 working committees for which I will be asking you to pray during the next 5 months. This month we will pray for two of them. In July, we will pray for the following:

3. The mission in the digital environment.

4. The revision of the Ratio Fundamentalis Institutionis Sacerdotalis in a missionary synodal perspective. This is the document that regulates the process of the formation of seminarians for the priesthood.

The Church wide participation in the Synodal Process has the potential of opening her to much needed restoration and revision.

Bus Trip to the Basilica National Shrine - The St. Therese Knights of Columbus #10409 Council is planning a bus trip to the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washing ton, D.C. It is the largest Roman Catholic church in North America and is home to more than 80 chapels and oratories that honor the Mother of God. This is one of the greatest moments in modern Church and Fr. John feels that all of the members of Visitation Parish have a right to information that has not otherwise available to them. After addressing Synodal issues, the last 15 minutes of each gathering will be devoted to a question and answer period about any questions you have about our Catholic Faith. Please consider participating in one, some, or all of these sessions.

From the Pastor's Desk:

This past week, several persons approached me to tell me that they could not access the "Go Fund Me" account set up by Cathy Fuska to assist with my post transplant expenses. Please know that I am most appre ciative of all that has been done for me by *you my family*. I car not even begin to thank you enough, especially for your extend ed prayerful support.

Before reflecting upon this week's regular teachings from Pope Francis, I need to draw your attention to something extremely important regarding the future of the Church of Altoona-Johnstown. This past week, the transfers of priests were released by the diocese. You will notice that the new pastors a younger than ever, having little time to serve under the leadership of older priests such as me in order to gain experience to pastor a parish community of faith (in my day, one needed to serve as an assistant for no less than 7 years before being consi ered for a pastorate – although I was thrown fast and furious into an administrative role). In any case, Good leadership is essential in any community, especially for the Church. We must continue to pray that God will call forth men who are devoted to our live tradition, sacramental existence and genuine compassion to become holy and creatively faithful pastors of both parishes and dioceses. We must call upon the Holy Spiri to help us to choose leaders who care about their people as the Good Shepherd cares for us. We are very much in need holy priests and compassionate bishops. (There will be more about bishops, their appointment, and their essential role as the foremost leaders of local churches (dioceses) as we move further with the discus sions regarding the committees established by Pope Francis for difficu issues for discussion at the October Synod).

In his Sunday Angelus Message this week, Pope Fran cis reflected upon the gospel where Jesus performed two healings through physical contact where the woman touches Jesus' cloak, and Jesus takes the girl by the hand. Why is this physical contact important? It is because these two women are considered impure and cannot, therefore, be physically touched - one because she suffers from blood loss and the other because she i dead. Yet, Jesus allows Himself to be touched and is not afraid to touch. Jesus challenges the false religious belief that God sep arates the pure, placing them on one side and the impure on th other. He does not keep us at a distance. God is not ashamed of us and does not judge us; He draws near to let Himself be touched and to touch us, and never discriminates against anyone because He loves everyone. Therefore, the pope insisted we must ask ourselves: Do we let ourselves be touched by the Lor by His Word, by His love? Do we relate to our brothers and sis ters by offering them a hand to lift them up, or do we keep our distance and label people based on our tastes and preferences? WE MUST ALWAYS look to the heart of God, so that the Church and society may neither exclude nor treat anyone as "impure," so that each person, with their own particular past, is welcomed and loved without labels, prejudices, or adjectives.

Pope Francis did not give his regular Wednesday Audience week due to a meeting that he had with the Consistory for the Causes of Saints regarding the beatification of 5 official venerable candidates for sainthood. The meeting began at 9:00 AM that
