

**IN LOVING MEMORY:** The Sanctuary Lamp is available for your intentions by calling the parish office. Please attempt to request your intentions as early as possible. A \$10 donation is suggested.

**SACRAMENT OF PENANCE:** Confessions will not be heard regularly until Fr. John has recovered from his liver transplant. Confession may AL-WAYS be arranged with Fr. John personally by calling the rectory office. Please avail yourselves to this life-giving sacrament!

**SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE:** Scheduled no less than **nine months** prior to the date of marriage. Four preparation sessions with the pastor, as well as all diocesan requirements, must be met. All Catholic candidates for Marriage must be registered, practicing members of a parish at least 6 months prior to scheduling the weddina.

**INFANT BAPTISM:** Baptisms are generally celebrated during one of the Sunday Liturgies. Prebaptismal instructions must be completed by the parents at least 3 weeks prior to the celebration of the sacrament. Catholic godparents must obtain a letter of eligibility from their pastors four weeks in advance. Baptisms are never celebrated during the Season of Lent.

**ANOINTING OF THE SICK:** Celebrated after any Sunday Mass as requested and as a parish during the Easter Season.

**MEMBERSHIP**: Forms are located on the back page of the bulletin (or on the parish website) to be filled out and sent to the parish. Registrations are also welcome by phone.

## From the Pastor's Desk:

MY PERSONAL REFLECTION FOR THE WEEK IS CONTAINED IN A BULLETIN INSERT.

In his **Angelus** message this part week, Pope Francis reflected upon the Gospel that tells us about Jesus who cures a man from blindness. His name is Bartimaeus, but the crowd in the street ignore him since he is a poor beggar. Those people do not have eyes for the blind man; they ignore him and leave him to fend for himself. They collectively do no extend a caring gaze, nor any feeling of compassion. Bartimaeus does not see either, but he hears and he makes himself heard. He shouts crying loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me. Jesus, however, hears and sees him. He places himself at his disposal and asks, "What do you want me to do for you?" "What do you want me to do for you?". This question, before a blind person, seems to be a provocation, and instead, it is a test. Jesus is asking Bartimaeus who he is truly looking for, and for what reason. Who is for you the "Son of David"? And thus, the Lord starts to open the blind man's eyes. Francis considers three aspects of this encounter, which becomes a dialogue: the cry, faith, the journey. First, the cry of Bartimaeus, which is not only a request for help; it is an affirmation of himself. The blind man is saying, "I exist, look at me. I do not see you, Jesus. Do you see me?". Yes, Jesus sees the beggar, and he listens to him, with the ears of the body and those of the heart. Think of ourselves, when we cross paths with a beggar on the street (literally or figuratively): how many times do we look away, how many times do we ignore him, as though he did not exist? And do we hear the cry of beggars? Second is the importance of faith. What does Jesus say? "Go your way; your faith has made you well." Bartimaeus sees because he believes; Christ is the light of his eyes. The Lord observes how Bartimaeus looks at him. How do we look at a beggar? Do we ignore him? Do we look at him like Jesus does? Are we capable of understanding his demands, his cry for help? When we give alms, do we look the beggar in the eye? Do we touch his hand to feel his flesh? Finally is the aspect of the journey. Bartimaeus, healed, "followed him on the way." But each one of us is Bartimaeus, blind within, who follows Jesus once he has approached Him. When we approach a poor person and make your proximity felt, it is Jesus who approaches us in the person of that poor man. Please, argues the pope, let us not be confused: alms are not the same as handouts. The person who receives the most grace from almsgiving is the one who gives, because he makes himself seen by the eyes of the Lord.

As Pope Francis continued his weekly catechesis on the Holy Spirit during his Wednesday Audience, he continues with a reflection on the presence and action of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church through the Sacraments. The sanctifying action of the Holy Spirit reaches us primarily through two channels: the Word of God and the Sacraments. And among all the Sacraments, there is one that is quintessentially the Sacrament of the Holy Spirit, It is the Sacrament of Confirmation. In the New Testament, beyond baptism with water, another rite is mentioned, that of the imposition of hands, which has the purpose of communicating the Holy Spirit visibly and in a charismatic way, with effects analogous to those produced by the Apostles at Pentecost. The Acts of the Apostles proclaim that having heard that some in Samaria had received the word of God, they sent Peter and John there from Jerusalem. They "went down and prayed for them, that they might receive the Holy Spirit, for it had not yet fallen upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit" (8:14-17).

God, in Christ, "has also put His seal upon us and given the Spirit in our hearts as a first installment (1:21 -22). The theme of the Holy Spirit as a "royal seal" with which Christ marks his sheep is the basis of the doctrine of the "indelible character" conferred by this rite. With the passing of time, the rite of anointing took shape as a Sacrament in itself, assuming diverse forms and content in the various ages and different rites of the Church. What the Sacrament of Confirmation is in the understanding of the Church seems to me to be described in a very simple and clear way by the Catechism of adults of the Italian Episcopal Conference. It says: "Confirmation is for all the faithful what Pentecost was for the entire Church. ... It reinforces the baptismal incorporation into Christ and the Church and the consecration to the prophetic, royal and priestly mission. It communicates the abundance of the gifts of the Spirit. Therefore, Baptism is the Sacrament of birth and, Confirmation is the Sacrament of growth. For this very reason it is also the Sacrament of witness, because this is closely linked to the maturity of Christian existence". The problem is to ensure that the Sacrament of Confirmation is not reduced, in practice, to the Sacrament of "departure" from the Church, because once young people do it they go away and then return for marriage (maybe). We must ensure that it is rather the Sacrament of active participation in the life of the Church. It is a milestone that can seem impossible, but this does not mean that we should stop pursuing it. It will not be so for all Confirmands, children or adults, but it is important that it is at least for some who will then go on to be the animators of the community. The pope insists that it can be useful, for this purpose, to be helped in preparing for the Sacrament by lay faithful who have had a personal encounter with Christ and have had a true experience of the Spirit. This does not relate only to future Confirmands; it relates to all of us and at any time. Together with Confirmation and anointing, we have received, according to Paul "the first fruits of the Spirit" (Rm 8:23). We must "spend" this bond, savor these first fruits, not bury underground the charisms and talents received. Saint Paul called the disciple Timothy to "stir into flame the gift of God that you have through the imposition of my hands" (2 Tim 1:6), suggesting the image of one who breathes on the fire to revive the flame. Here is a good goal for the Jubilee year! To remove the ashes of habit and disengagement, to become, like the torchbearers at the Olympics, bearers of the flame of the Spirit.

-Paul writes in the Second Letter to the Corinthians: that

A REMINDER TO ALL THE FAITHFUL: You may have forgotten that Tuesday, November 5th is election day. ⊙ □ If you have not yet voted in person or by mail, please be certain to fulfill your patriotic and Catholic moral duty to VOTE. If you feel tired and disgusted by the current election climate and feel inclined not to vote, remember "we are our brothers' and sisters' keepers." We are responsible for the world that we leave to future generations who are by default often becoming the least of our brothers and sisters. Keep them ALL, the unprotected and under-protected of today and tomorrow, in mind on Tuesday and always.
