## From the Pastor's Desk

Once again I find myself at the end of a very full week and there are so many things upon which I would like to reflect; however, do to limits on time and space, especially this week, I will limit myself to only a few.

First, I would like to reflect upon our need to continually pray for our Pope, Holy Father Francis, especially during this period of time when he is dealing with some significant health concerns. As you pray, I would ask that you do not become tempted to follow the misrepresentations of certain media outlets that would have the pope on his deathbed and the Church on the verge of a conclave during which the 267<sup>th</sup> pope of our Catholic tradition would be elected. The fact is that the pope is seriously ill. He is battling the complications of double pneumonia and another serious infection. He is indeed experiencing significant health concerns at the time of this writing which means quite frankly that he needs to be the object of our vigilant prayer. In a world that is prone to exaggeration and fanaticism, we need to stay focused and realize that the Holy Spirit remains in charge as does the Vicar of Christ, Pope Francis. May God provide him with the healing, courage, and strength that he requires to prevail in this hour of need.

Second, I would like to draw attention to the fact that during this coming week that the Catholic community begins the Lenten Season. On this insert, you will find a listing of all the spiritual opportunities for growth offered by our parish during this holy and penitential period. I challenge all of you to make the most of this Lent. It is so easy for God to take second place in our lives because of the busyness that the world sets before us – all things that are passing, all things that will eventually cease to exist. In the coming forty days we have the opportunity to reorient our lives to make Christ first, exactly where he should always be. We all know that we could be more intimate in our dealings with Christ. As we prepare to enter into Lent, perhaps we can ask what is holding us back, and through practices of prayer and penance, we can "hit the mark" and enter more deeply into the process of conversion.
